





Implementation Strategy, 2018 – 2020 Comparison





2020 PROGRESS REPORT

In May 2017, the City of Hyattsville adopted Speak Up HVL: Community Sustainability Plan as the guiding 2017-2021 document for the City over the next 5 years. The Plan can be accessed here. The Plan encompasses a broad range of culture, social, economic and other priorities for the city, and is used by the City Council, City staff and community residents to set goals and measure progress. The vision plan is thriving city, grounded in for this to create a sustainability inclusiveness, that advances the lives and residents through the building of its community, connectivity of people and places, and responsible development.

The Plan is structured around 3 major themes, community, connectivity, and development, which emerged through analysis of public meetings, and resident feedback. Various action steps were defined based on these themes to bring the plan's goals to fruition.

To report progress made towards achieving these goals, City staff will produce annual Progress Reports to keep the community informed, identify city budget priorities, and guide staff work plans. This report serves as the FY2020 review of progress made since the plan's implementation.





After identifying each theme, an implementation strategy was created to bring these goals into action.

A total of 67 action steps were instated where each project was assigned a priority timeline designation of ongoing (currently underway), nearterm (12 months post adoption), mid-term (1-3 years post adoption), and long-term (3-5 years post adoption), to help staff and the City Council focus their efforts.

The 2020 Progress Report highlights the status of major projects that are either complete, in progress (in the course of being completed), ongoing (currently underway), and not started.

FY20 marked the first year of the City's Corridor Investment Grant Program. \$25,000 was allotted for the program which funded (12) projects throughout the City. Project categories included Programming, Placemaking, and Business Development.

The City Council allocated funds for the program to continue for a second cycle in FY2021.



Summary Background:

The Hyattsville City Council adopted HO2013-03 establishing the Revitalization Tax Credit. Since that time, the City has received comment from residents regarding the urgency of ensuring affordability in housing in the city. As proximity to transit areas promotes access for jobs and regional mobility, concentrating our efforts on affordable housing within the existing transit zones appears to be ideal. This legislation will offer the Mayor and Council guidance for consideration of abatement requests.

The City Council has directed the City Attorney to amend §108-4 of the City Code to include eligible real property which is dedicated to the production of affordable housing units for individuals and families whose taxable income constitute sixty percent (60%) of Average Median Income (AMI).

This amendment was discussed by the City Council at the meeting of July 20, 2020.

Next Steps:

This item is tentatively scheduled for adoption in September 2020.

City Administrator Comments:

The City staff understands the amendment is intended to provide eligibility criteria for the creation and/or preservation of affordable housing units. The amended language may be effective at incentivizing affordable housing developers or market rate developers to construct affordable dwelling units within the City limits.

Upon receipt of applications, the City will commission a financial evaluation to determine a project's financial gap and asses the City's capacity to support the request. Once complete, the staff will bring the action back to Council for resolution.

- Up to 50% tax credit for rehabilitation projects that maintain the existing inventory of affordable units (by project) for no more than 10 years.

Projects receiving waivers of public safety or school facility surcharges shall be ineligible. Designated affordable units shall remain affordable for 30 years.

I further move that the City Administrator (or her designee) acquire professional services for independent financial review of applications submitted under this credit.

I further move that the City Administrator (or her designee) be authorized to establish partnerships necessary to provide property owners with a contact (or similar) to identify Prince George's County residents that meet income qualifications and are awaiting affordable units.

I further move that the City Administrator (or her designee) establish/modify administrative procedures and applications associated with this amendment and publish--not less than annually--projects receiving benefits under this agreement effective July 1, 2019.

The City has been a frequent recipient of Maryland Energy Administration Smart Energy Communities Grants over the past several years. After researching the available options staff decided to pursue the electric truck body produced by BYD Motors, LLC and the body sold and installed by Curbtender, Inc. This option provided the best truck available to the City as the best price available.



Summary Background:

The City Council passed a motion on March 18th, 2019 that:

- a) Authorized the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of, and legal requirements for, changing the name of Magruder Park.
- b) Authorized the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of and legal requirements for updating the deed to exclude the offensive language as defined in the motion summary background details and effectively remove any restrictions on use of the public amenity that would be considered discriminatory as defined by the Hyattsville Human Rights Act.
- c) Directed the City Administrator to assist the City Council by preparing recommendations, based on the tools available to the City of Hyattsville, to encourage a public engagement process.

The City Attorney worked with outside counsel to prepare and record in the land records a deed, and other required documentation, that removes the discriminatory language contained in the original Park conveyance.

With the completion of parts a) and b), the staff is providing the following recommendations for Council discussion. Recommendations comply with the motion directive and are intended to engage the community in the process to select a name for the park that is welcoming, inclusive, and unifying.

- a) Announce the Name Selection Challenge and timeline in the Hyattsville Life and Times, on Social Media, and in the Green Sheet. The announcements will ask the public to provide input through the City's customer service phone line, City website, a suggestion box at the park, or by email to ParkName@Hyattsville.org mailto:ParkName@Hyattsville.org.
- b) The Communications Department will collect, sort, and consolidate the information and provide it to two (2) of our Committees. The staff recommends requesting support from the Health, Wellness, and Recreation Advisory Committee and the Race and Equity Task Force. Others may be interested.
- c) The Committees will select their top five (5) recommendations. The final three (3) to five (5) recommendations may be provided to our residents in the Green Sheet which may have tear-away, pre-paid postage for return to the municipal building.
- d) Public hearing or kick-off meeting optional.

- a) Authorize the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of and legal requirements for changing the name of Magruder Park without reverting ownership of the land back to the Magruder Family and/or Estate. The City Administrator and/or City Attorney will be required to report back their findings to the City Council within 120 days of passage of this motion. In the event additional research time is required, the City Administrator may request an extension from the City Council.
- b) Authorize the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of and legal requirements for updating the deed to exclude the offensive language as defined in the motion summary background details and effectively remove any restrictions on use of the public amenity that would be considered discriminatory as defined by the Hyattsville Human Rights Act. The City Administrator and/or City Attorney will be required to present its findings to the City Council within 120 days of passage of this motion. In the event additional research time is required, the City Administrator may request an extension from the City Council.

The City Administrator shall provide the City Council, in all regular status updates, the progress related to this research effort, including (but not be limited too) legal expenses (total expenses on this effort should be reported and council should be advised when and if these expenses reach \$10,000.00), partnership efforts, and any additional actions required by the Council to support investigating this matter.

Upon receipt of the work product resulting from parts a) and b) of this motion, the City Council shall devise an action plan to address the community implications associated with the property's history and the City's relationship with the donor (and/or his Estate). The action plan shall include measures the Council deems appropriate, as well as the supporting process, timeline, and community outreach and engagement. The City Administrator shall assist the City Council in this effort by preparing recommendations based on the tools available to the City of Hyattsville, Hyattsville historical precedent, models used by other governments or quasi government entities, and any recommended best practices.

Among other examples, these actions are best evidenced by the following excerpt from Magruder's deed of Magruder Park to the City of Hyattsville, "... IN TRUST NEVERTHELESS to hold said land as a public recreation park and playground to be known as WILLIAM PINKNEY MAGRUDER PARK, for the Caucasian inhabitants only of the said town of Hyattsville," and, "... to issue permits permitting persons of the Caucasian race, not inhabitants of said town."

I move that the Mayor and Council take the following actions to determine the feasibility of a name change of William Pinkney Magruder Park (hereafter referred to as Magruder Park):

- a) Authorize the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of and legal requirements for changing the name of Magruder Park without reverting ownership of the land back to the Magruder Family and/or Estate. The City Administrator and/or City Attorney will be required to report back their findings to the City Council within 120 days of passage of this motion. In the event additional research time is required, the City Administrator may request an extension from the City Council.
- b) Authorize the City Attorney to investigate the feasibility of and legal requirements for updating the deed to exclude the offensive language as defined in the motion summary background details and effectively remove any restrictions on use of the public amenity that would be considered discriminatory as defined by the Hyattsville Human Rights Act. The City Administrator and/or City Attorney will be required to present its findings to the City Council

within 120 days of passage of this motion. In the event additional research time is required, the City Administrator may request an extension from the City Council.

The City Administrator shall provide the City Council, in all regular status updates, the progress related to this research effort, including (but not be limited too) legal expenses (total expenses on this effort should be reported and council should be advised when and if these expenses reach \$10,000.00), partnership efforts, and any additional actions required by the Council to support investigating this matter.

Upon receipt of the work product resulting from parts a) and b) of this motion, the City Council shall devise an action plan to address the community implications associated with the property's history and the City's relationship with the donor (and/or his Estate). The action plan shall include measures the Council deems appropriate, as well as the supporting process, timeline, and community outreach and engagement. The City Administrator shall assist the City Council in this effort by preparing recommendations based on the tools available to the City of Hyattsville, Hyattsville historical precedent, models used by other governments or quasi government entities, and any recommended best practices.

Mayor Hollingsworth cited some of the language in the motion stating that the last sentence of the motion should be removed to be consistent with the actions taken regarding the measure.

Ward 3 Councilmember Thomas Wright recalled that he initially requested the removal because the Body did not want to take action until the legal ramifications were assessed to which Mayor Hollingsworth stated that she was content with leaving the language unedited, but wanted to demonstrate transparency about her concerns about the cited language being contentious. She conveyed that she would rather have recommendations be the responsibility of the Council and not the City staff.

Councilmember Solomon explained that it was not the intent to place the City responsible for making decisions for Council and it was important that there was an understanding of what options were available for developing a process.

Council President Haba recollected specific changes to the language that were implemented and stating his acceptance of the motion as it stood.
