Location: Driskell Park

Customer: City of Hyattsville

Dates: 9/27-11/7, 2022

Hours: 7am - 7pm

Overview: A Throne was placed in Driskell Park in the parking

lot next to a picnic shelter. There were two other brick and mortar bathrooms in the park – both a short walk away. The Throne served events such as the park naming ceremony and Zombie Run as well as general use. The City discovered things they didn't know from the data such as heavy use on Tuesdays was driven by a weekly homeschool meetup that

happened in the park.



Pilot success was evaluated based on usage volume, user satisfaction and community feedback.

Metrics were determined in collaboration with Hyattsville Public Works Department staff prior to pilot start.


Metric	Success Criteria	
Usage	People use it! Hoping to learn and see 10+/day	Daily average was 12.5 One day high was 41 (Oct 15) Tuesdays average 21.5
Feedback from Users	Approximately 70%+ of users that provide feedback to the City regarding their experience using the Throne should be positive (The average cleanliness rating gathered by Throne during the pilot period may be used as a metric for consideration)	77% of ratings were three stars or "sparkling clean" 12% were 2 stars or "just ok"
Feedback from Public	Generally neutral or positive feedback from community members	Comments were either positive about restroom innovation or worried about ADA access and unhoused access (smartphones)

Usage & Cleanliness Data

Driskell Park usage was heavily influenced by weather. Nice days brought high usage. Other drivers of use included events and a weekly homeschool meetup.

Average Uses per Day: 21.5


Throne Uses by Date: Driskell Park


Driskell Park Cleanliness Ratings





Data Trends

Throne generated additional insight for Public Works to look at usage distribution by hour during the Throne's highest use day (CycloCross Event) – data shows general use was high, not just tied to event.



Community feedback was minimal and either positive or focused on equity of access

The City posted about Throne to social media channels and got primarily positive response, with some community members raising need for disabled access and ways for unhoused individuals without phones to access the bathroom.



The City is piloting a new Throne Bathroom in Driskell Park! The Throne company, located in neighboring Brentwood, MD, aims to offer clean restrooms for everyone. The Throne comes with a flushing toilet and running water, and is accessed using a smartphone code to encourage user accountability. Learn more at www.thronelabs.co.



A Throne access card is currently in testing and will be rolled out to enable those without a phone to enter Thrones while maintaining accountability









A 3-pronged approach to safe and secure bathrooms for all

QR / Text



Users can enter in less than 10 seconds – a simple text opens the door.



Mobile App



App offers added features like discovery, navigation and real time cleanliness ratings.

Tap to Open



Throne is partnering with service providers to give access cards to unhoused and marginalized populations.

3) Automated Occupancy Detection & Response Systems
