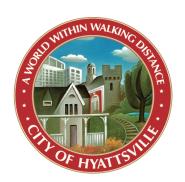

2025_04_02 Meeting: Missing information in the Council Discussion Expenditures



Dear Mayor and Council Members,

Could the Council begin identifying action items in meeting summaries and ensure follow-up on them in subsequent meetings until they are resolved? This common practice would greatly enhance transparency. I propose that the Council formally adopt this practice.

At least two important action items remain unaddressed:

- 1. During the March 3 meeting, Mr. Brooks agreed to post the current city debt information online. Although the document exists, it has not been made available yet.
- 2. On March 3, Mr. Brooks submitted an expenditure of \$122,046 for item 8.e Purchase of Replacement Vehicles for the Police Department without specifying the fund from which it would be paid. When asked, he was unable to identify the fund during the meeting, nor did he provide this information afterward.

These items highlight incomplete financial data being provided to both the Council and the residents.

Incomplete financial information is an especially big problem during FY26 budget discussions. For example, the proposed city deficit of \$1.6 million for FY26 may look much worse when considering that the city has a \$43 million debt to repay over the next 23 years. Additionally, the \$30 million the city received for assuming this debt has not been disclosed in the FY26 budget. What is the fund holding this money, and how much remains in it? Knowing the city's debt and balance for capital improvement fund is essential when discussing the FY26 budget, and this information should be clearly disclosed in the report.

Another issue to address is the employee benefits (fringes).

The FY26 budget proposal, includes \$14 million for salaries and \$7.9 million for benefits, giving a benefits-to-salary ratio of 56.20%. For small businesses, this ratio typically ranges from 15-30%, and for police departments, it is generally between 20-40%. If the city were to pay an average benefits ratio of 28%, this would result in approximately \$3.9 million in benefits, saving about \$4 million in FY26. Some of these savings could be used to increase salaries or address the projected deficit.



Notice of Code Violation – Unauthorized Use of Gas Blower and Request for Council Record



Dear City Council Members and City Clerk,

This is a notice to the City of Hyattsville regarding a clear violation of the City's Code related to prohibited gas-powered blowers, witnessed and documented today, April 2, 2025, at the property.

Summary of Violation: At approximately 11:19 AM today, video and photographic evidence were taken showing persons working on this property using a **gas-powered blower** in direct violation of **Hyattsville** City Code Chapter 87-24(D). The workers were affiliated with a contractor operating under the company name "SMC" (see attached photo), as identified by two clearly marked work vehicles present on-site. A photo of the contractor vehicles is attached to this email for reference.

City Agency Notifications: In addition to this written notice, the following steps were taken:

1. Code Enforcement and Police Department Notified:

The City of Hyattsville Code Enforcement Division and Police Department (operator #537) were made aware of this violation immediately after it was observed.

2. Hyattsville Patrol Vehicle 'ED11' Notified:

A City of Hyattsville marked patrol vehicle, designated as **ED11**, was stopped in the area and directly informed of the violation. The driver of this patrol vehicle refused to identify himself when asked. This behavior is concerning and reflects a lack of transparency expected from public employees tasked with enforcing city laws.

Request for Council Record: Please include this formal notice and attached evidence as public comment in the official record of tonight's City Council Meeting scheduled for April 2, 2025, at 7:00 PM. I request that the City Clerk ensure this notice is entered into the meeting minutes and made part of the public record.

Further Concerns: I would like to bring to the Council's attention a pattern of **arbitrary and inconsistent responses** to Code Enforcement calls such as this. It is my expectation that this matter will not only be documented but also followed by a direct and transparent review of how Code Enforcement responds to residents' lawful concerns.

I specifically request that the Council address the need for **sanctions and accountability measures** regarding any City staff who fail to properly enforce the City's environmental codes or who refuse to

appropriately identify themselves when approached by residents.
